Foundational Learners Assistance Eligibility

Alberta Community and Social Services is committed to ensuring that supports are available to assist learners in completing their high school education. Therefore, Prospect Human Services is contracted to provide Assessment and Case Management services for 16 - 20 year old learners seeking financial supports to attend public high school.

The Prospect Human Service's website is www.ProspectNow.ca which can help with a bit of information on Prospect Human Services including our mission, supporters, programs, and much more! The Youth Assessment Centre (YAC), a division of Prospect who works with the Foundational Learners Assistance Program, does not have a link on the site. This is because our division and funding is accessed through referrals from people like you and is not recommended to the general public.

We run strictly off of the GOA policies based on Foundational Learners Assistance Funding, aimed towards students aged 16-20 in K-12 education programs, who demonstrate financial need and whether or not they meet the following criteria:

- i) Pregnant, or
- ii) Single with a dependent child, or
- III) Married or in a cohabiting relationship, or
- Student is 18+ and demonstrating financial need, or iv)
- There is a breakdown in relationship with the learner's guardians v)

The student must be registered "Full Time" at an approved educational facility. "Full Time" is defined as being registered and participating in a minimum of 3 classes per semester.

Alberta Works funded learners are expected to attend the program, make acceptable progress, achieve their training goal and facilitate a successful transition to further education or employment. Funding is based on participation/ progression in the classes and consultations with the student as well as the school.

In order to Apply for Foundational Learners Assistance students will need to obtain: Their Social Insurance Number

- My Alberta Digital ID https://account.alberta.ca/(this is where they can create an account if they do not already have one)
 - · After creating an account the government will send verification in the mail; takes 5-10 days
 - If they do not have the documents required to obtain a MADI, we can work on an Alternate ID Verification process with them
- Banking Information no form anymore but we do need the Transit, Routing, and Account Number

There are 3 different Branches' to the Application process: the MADI, the email link from Foundational Learners Assistance, and the Assessment completed by our Coordinators.

Once all 3 have been completed/ received, we can start the Application.
